In June 2019, the City Council passed an ordinance sensibly regulating short-term rentals like Airbnb in Jersey City.

On Tuesday November 5th, Municipal Question #1 will ask residents whether they want the regulations.

Here's what you need to know

- Q: Is this a ban?
- 🔃 What are short-term rentals?
- I currently rent out a couple bedrooms and an apartment unit in my home on Airbnb to earn extra money.

 Can I still do this?
- I'm a teacher who Airbnb's my entire home when I go to the shore in the summer. Can I still do this?
- What do I have to do to rent my home on Airbnb, VRBO, and other websites?
- Why was the ordinance put in place?
- Q: Why am I receiving this FAQ?
- Where can I learn more?

- NO. The ordinance allows short-term rentals as long as basic rules are met to protect neighborhood safety and quality of life, and keep housing costs low.
- Renting out bedrooms, units or entire homes for anything less than 28 days. Popularized by online websites like Airbnb, VRBO and Homeaway.
- YES. A homeowner can continue to rent out up to 3 bedrooms and up to 2 full apartment units in their home as long as they live in the home (or have someone designated to be on site for them who lives in the home).
- **YES.** Entire homes can be short-term rented while the host is <u>away</u> for up to 60 days per year. Note: this 60-day limit <u>only</u> applies if the host is away; there are no limits for an onsite host.
- Simply get a permit, prove you're a Jersey City homeowner who lives in the home, complete a basic fire safety inspection, meet common sense safety requirements, pay a \$250 one-time fee and renew for \$200 each year. These fees are easily reimbursed with 1-2 rental nights as the average daily short-term rental rate in Jersey City is between \$100-\$200 per night.
- To address quality of life, safety and overall housing affordability. Unlike what you may have heard, there are currently no restrictions on short term rentals. Entire homes and apartment buildings are turning into unregulated, full-time "hotels" with no host on-site. This creates problems with noise, trash, safety, and parking for full-time residents and strains NYC commuter lines that are already at capacity. Less housing for residents also means higher rents.
- The ordinance will be put to a public vote on **Election Day: Tuesday, November 5, 2019**. If you support these sensible regulations and want to protect Jersey City communities, show up to vote and **VOTE YES** to **Municipal Question #1**
